So thank you, again, board members, thank you, administrators, thank you, Presidential Ambassador Leadership Students, PALS, and your annual Legacy Projects, and thank you, faculty, staff, and students for your enthusiasm and support. I also respectfully wish to acknowledge the financial contributions of Mr. and Mrs. Scott South and Mr. Don Helfgott, CEO of Inspiration Software, when 72 hours from institutional closure by the U.S. Department of Education, gave me the financial resources to finally balance our NCNM budget.

Further, some comments to the Class of 2009 whom I join today on this joyous and memorable Commencement. First, this is your day, you have earned it, and you deserve it! However, a commencement is the beginning of your journey, not the end. I respectfully request you now use your time, talents, and treasures in natural medicine to heal our citizens and educate them about disease prevention and good health practices.
