All of this exciting activity is part of a resurgence for NCNM, a wonderful tipping point leading us headlong toward the next decade.

In the next few years we'll see our vision take root and grow: Besides an amazing clinic, we'll build new facilities with special educational and life spaces for faculty and students. We'll also create new full-and part-time programs to become the largest provider of natural medicine services in the Pacific Northwest.

At the same time, we'll better support our graduates through continuing education, business and professional development, research—and even publishing. We're working hard to win your support for what your college needs to become to thrive. We want you to be proud of your school as it changes and grows. As our new campus transforms, we'll be on the cusp of our seventh decade as America's foremost college of natural medicine.

NCNM Shines at AANP Convention

Naturopathic medicine's largest annual conference, the 2008 American Association of Naturopathic Physicians Convention, held in Phoenix, was bigger than ever this year. The August conference was packed with more than 900 physicians, students and visitors who filled classes, research symposiums, presentations and award ceremonies. NCNM students and alumni swept up award categories, honoring the school and promoting the quality of education our students receive.

Physician of the Year

NCNM alumna, **Dr. Marcia Prenguber**, was honored with the 2008 AANP "Physician of the Year Award" for her outstanding work in the practice of naturopathic medicine. Dr. Prenguber, a nationally and internationally recognized speaker on naturopathic and integrative treatment, is the president of the Council on Naturopathic Medical Education and the director of Integrative Care at the Goshen Center for Cancer Care. The "Physician of the Year Award" recognizes individuals who demonstrate outstanding leadership, modeling, ethics and individual achievement. NCNM applauds Dr. Prenguber for her achievement.

Helfgott Research Captures Prize

Three NCNM naturopathic medical students were awarded the AANP's "Best Student Research" prize for research conducted at the Helfgott Research Institute. Third-year students Andrew Erlandsen, Jeremy Mikolai and Andrew Murison found that drinking whole cows' milk with Ashwagandha, an herb used for more than 5,000 years in the practice of Ayurvedic medicine, can increase the body's white blood cells and help boost immunity. This original research study was led by Helfgott's Director of Research, Dr. Heather Zwickey, and will be published later this fall.

- If applicable, grant acknowledgements must be provided at the end of the abstract (e.g., NIH-AI-12345).
- More than one abstract per investigator may be submitted for consideration.

CAM Research

The future of CAM medicine research is evolving rapidly. We're in a new era of research collectives. Practice-based research networks (PBRN) are in the spotlight as a means of studying the characteristic diseases of the 21st century. Practitioners across disciplines collect observational data on conditions difficult to characterize under standard double-blind placebo trials. Researchers can then analyze the data necessary to establish an evidence-based foundation with outcome measures specific for these conditions.

In natural medicine, treatment plans are as unique as the patient. By using observational techniques, we can gather all of these unique attributes and use their similarities to develop solid outcome measures that make the research we do even more beneficial in today's health care marketplace.

ND Partner, a research group that's part of the Helfgott Research Institute, began as an initiative to expand CAM observational research using the PBRN model. We're recruiting practitioners interested in joining the

In September, Dr. MacKay, joined the Council for Responsible Nutrition (CRN) as vice president, scientific and regulatory affairs.

In his new position at CRN, he'll continue to further the science surrounding dietary supplements and nutrition; he'll also advise, educate and represent CRN's members on regulatory matters impacting the industry. Dr. MacKay will serve as CRN's resident

expert on botanicals and will continue to encourage companies to focus on high quality botanical products as part of a mainstream culture of wellness.

Prior to joining CRN, Dr. MacKay served as vice president of clinical research for Nordic Naturals. Previously he served as a senior technical advisor for Thorne Research and senior editor of the peer-reviewed clinical journal, Alternative Medicine Review. In addition, he saw patients in a complementary and alternative private practice in New Hampshire, the Makai Naturopathic Center, which he co-owned.

Dr. MacKay has worked as a medical consultant and a scientific advisor for the dietary supplement industry since 1999 and is a frequent lecturer. He has also published research and articles in peer-reviewed journals.

Ancient Medicine, Modern Scholars

Name Wang, MD, PhD, the founder of the American Institute of Eastern Medicine (AIEM) in Scottsdale, Ariz., in its "Ancient Medicine, Modern Scholars" campus speaker series. Dr. Wang, a professor at China's Tongji Medical College of Huazhong University, became Japan's very first

foreign associate professor in the Department of Gastroenterology at Juntendo University's School of Medicine.

Dr. Wang gave two presentations exploring the roots of traditional (vs. classical) Chinese medicine. He discussed

the future, practicality and effectiveness of integrative medicine, his research with diabetes and the development of Ketsumeisei, a proprietary herbal compound.

Students and faculty alike were enthusiastic about Dr. Wang's lectures. His visit to the campus was successful in other ways: The AIEM joined NCNM's Partners Program at the Regents' Circle level with an extraordinary five-year contribution of \$660,000, one of the largest donations NCNM has received in its 52-year history. AIEM's support will fund research, state-of-the-art medicinary

More than 20 enthusiastic students and doctors participated in "Earth, Herbs, Water, Fire, Air: A Practical Exploration of Naturopathic Vitalism," a learning retreat weekend held in July at the Eclectic Farm in Sandy, Oregon, courtesy of Edward K. Alstat, president of the Eclectic Institute and former NCNM professor of pharmacy and plant chemistry. The Eclectic Institute was founded by Dr. Alstat in 1984 to use nature's healing power in the preparation of botanical products for health and well-being.

Dr. Glen Nagel and Dr. Sussanna Czeranko served up a menu of old nature cure healing treatments featuring earth, herbs, water, fire and plenty of fresh air. The participants shared experiences they won't soon forget, including being cocooned in wet sheet wraps and immersed in black peat water baths.

The tranquil setting of Eclectic Farm was a perfect environment for the group to conduct herbal walks and explorations. The harvesting of hypericum flowers was a powerful reminder of our amazing medicine and its roots. The dynamic weekend experience, made possible through Dr. Alstat's generosity, was an exciting learning experience for students and doctors alike.

Medicine on the Move

The second annual "Medicine on the Move" event, kicked off during the first week of school, introduced incoming students to the NCNM community. According to Helfgott Research Coordinator, Erin Connelly, "The goal for the event was to move future practitioners from the margins of prevention to the core by identifying best practices and illustrating prevention principles in a variety of settings." Sponsored by The CHP Group (formerly Complementary Healthcare Plans), students explored racial and socioeconomic inequalities in health care while learning about the Portland community. They visited a variety of nonprofit resource centers that provide critical services, including Yellow Brick Road Street Outreach, Legacy Hopewell House Hospice, Cascade AIDS, Oregon Food Bank and Dignity Village.

Creating Memories in Spain

In the small hillside village of Xiva near the coast of central Spain, Friedhelm Kirchfeld and his wife Sarah stroll down a cobblestone street arm-in-arm at sunset. Life is simple here and for three months out of each year Xiva is their home. Mornings are spent on the veranda enjoying a traditional European breakfast of fresh bread and jam while listening to the cow bells in the distance. The days are hot and must be spent inside the cool stone house built in the middle ages. Twice a day Friedhelm walks the same path to a beautiful religious ruin along a tiny brook flowing through town. Xiva is the kind of place you would never forget. However, for Friedhelm remembering proves to be more of a challenge than usual.

After 25 years of service to NCNM as head librarian, Friedhelm Kirchfeld retired in September 2005 and was subsequently diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease. His many contributions to naturopathic medicine include building the college's rare book room and coauthoring "Nature Doctors," a historical description of the pioneers in the field. Friedhelm not only facilitated the growth of naturopathic education at NCNM, he dedicated his life to the power of the medicine for health and healing.

Friedhelm has been under the care of Dr. Gene Bowman, a 2004 NCNM alumni and assistant

professor at Oregon Health & Science University's Department of Neurology. Dr. Bowman is intimately involved in the field of neurodegenerative disorders as a National Institutes of Health funded clinician-researcher studying the link between nutrition and Alzheimer's.

Friedhelm's treatment regimen has been aggressive, including diet and exercise modification, supplements and intravenous therapy. Sarah noted her husband's positive differences after treatments and invited Dr. Bowman to visit Friedhelm in Spain over the summer. Arriving with a bag full of naturopathic supplies, Dr. Bowman spent four days in the gracious company of the Kirchfelds. Friedhelm greeted him with a warm smile each morning. The relationship between patient and doctor began to blur the lines of formalities to arrive at a place of friendship, respect and faith. Dr. Bowman notes, "Much of the history of the medicine has been organized eloquently by Friedhelm through his service to NCNM. It's hard to watch an irreversible disorder progress in anyone, but especially in someone whose cognitive faculties have contributed so much to our profession through education."

Dr. Bowman is hopeful that the treatment will slow the neurodegeneration and help maintain Friedhelm's quality of life. Friedhelm and Sarah are hopeful that they can continue to create long-lasting memories in Spain, Portland and around the world.
